
FROM THE PRESIDENTS PEN

Where is Australia Headed?

There is a consistent trend in our society which should give us cause for concern. There is an increasingly intolerant tone of public debate on

important national issues which is being fanned by the media. It seems media outlets and personalities adopt and then advocate policies that they feel comfortable with using their outlets to pursue these agendas as if these are societal norms when they are very often not. These are then passed off as "news" when in truth what is pushed into the public arena is a range of personal or specific interest group's own opinions. In the process real news is most often ignored and the general public is subjected to a process of conditioning to accept these views as fact. There is also a concerted campaign to stifle the voices of those who wish to put an alternative view to those held by some of the more vocal media commentators and interest groups who support their ideas. The use of the tools of government in an attempt to shut down so called "dissenting voices" is a very worrying development. What has happened to our easy going tolerance of one another? Surely it is time to take stock of where we are headed with increasing political correctness. Without question we need to respect each other but this involves respecting the right of others to have different points of view and express themselves. We don't all have to agree on issues but we must give space for others to disagree with us. If we continue to go down the pathway we are now on, we will end up with a virtual dictatorship where diverging viewpoints are not tolerated and those who express them hauled before courts and tribunals to be punished for expressing their ideas. Already it seems that everywhere you turn interest groups and their followers rail against any that do not agree with their point of view and in too many cases do so with violence. 2019 is an election year and we will be bombarded with paid political advertisements pushing the agendas of political parties. I think this election is more important than we realise as some of the policies already in the public domain herald changes that will have profound and lasting effects on our communities. We will be subjected to truths, half-truths and outright lies. We will have to be on our guard so we are not taken in by glib 30 second TV and radio clips promising a rosy future when in fact there is a cost to us all behind every one of these promises. The seemingly simple propositions put by some of our political leaders hide the real danger of fundamental changes to our government structure that will end up with more power in the hands of politicians and bureaucrats than we would be comfortable with. As well we are living in a region of the World where there are developing storms that could well threaten our national safety yet it seems our defence capability is held hostage to the political whims of a few politicians more worried about their chances for re-election than the country's defence needs.

The RSL motto that "the price of liberty is eternal vigilance" is more relevant now than ever!



About our Sub Branch and its Club

RSL licenced and gaming Sub Branches are part of a network of community clubs that is integral to the fabric of the Victorian community. Our collective future depends in part on the community's understanding of the role and benefits community clubs (including the RSL network) bring to Victorians. It is important to understand that our trading operations are essential to generate the revenue from which these benefits are funded. Some of this revenue comes from gaming operations but gaming is always only an adjunct to what we offer our members.

Clubs including this Sub Branch have a community based "reason for being" - be it sporting, charitable, social or community based. Of course our primary objective as an RSL Sub Branch is to support serving and former ADF members and their families as well as our other members. We offer members activities and facilities to host "get togethers" to enjoy each other's company, to swap stories and particularly for veterans to share experiences and support and help each other in an empathetic environment.

Fast Facts & Figures

The welfare and community support work of the Sub Branch is a major focus.

•Over a year we help some hundreds of veterans in the Eastern Metropolitan Region of Melbourne. We provide assistance with their claims for support from the Department of Veterans' Affairs and our Welfare Coordinator and her team of volunteers provide much needed welfare and practical support to veterans in our region as well as to the older and less mobile members of the Sub Branch. These volunteer services include in-home and hospital support, welfare help, transport assistance, mobility aids as well as minor house and garden maintenance etc. for a number of our frailer members and also for others in our community who need our help. This volunteer support to the Maroondah community is worth in excess of \$366,137.

• We have been involved with a number of local football teams spread from Mitcham to East Ringwood to partner with them in providing suitable ANZAC commemorative services as a public service.

• We provide bursaries and assistance worth \$1,800 for children attending Ringwood, Heathmont and Norwood Secondary Colleges.

• We support the Maroondah Brass and the Ringwood Pipe Bands with sponsorship of \$3,000 each.

• We provide support to members of the Sub Branch with subsidised meals and refreshments, and other "in club" activities designed to combat social isolation and enhance camaraderie among veterans and their families. The cost for these was approximately \$337,000. In addition we have allocated Loyalty Points able to be spent in participating RSL establishments in Victoria at a cost to the Sub Branch of \$28,232.

• The Welfare/Courtesy Bus is provided for members benefit as part of our social inclusion program at a cost of \$49,317.

• We provide sponsorship of the Women's Auxiliary, War Widows, the Day Club and Sub Branch Sporting Sub Sections worth over \$28,050.

• We provide \$4950 sponsorship to the Ringwood Football Club, \$4,000 sponsorship for Eastern United Football (soccer) Club and \$2,000 for the Raptors Rugby Club.

• We provide facilities either free of charge or at nominal rates for local community group activities at a cost of \$28,600 during 2018.

• We contribute about \$2.9m to the local community in goods and services purchased and employment of 50 staff.

We are not for profit. We operate with the sole purpose of supporting veterans, our members and their families. That said, the revenue from gaming helps enables us to continue play an important role in the health and well-being of veterans and their families. Contrary to popular belief, problem gambling is in decline, having reduced from 2.5% to less than 1% (0.7%). This is because the Government and industry have been working hard to create a properly regulated and responsible industry.

Securing our Future

To ensure we are well positioned to continue to provide services to veterans, our other members and the local community the Committee has been evaluating our future needs and developing a strategy based around these. This strategy will of necessity involve developing facilities that will be fit for purpose for the next 15-20 years.

As a result we have been engaged in detailed discussions with two consortia concerning a future redevelopment of our current site. At the same time we continue to talk to the Maroondah Sports Club about the possibility of a shared future.

Whilst the committee is refining its approach I expect we will be in a position soon to put a definite proposal to members for agreement.

BANTER FROM THE MANAGER

To all the members, committee and staff I would like to wish you a happy, healthy and prosperous year in 2019. It will be our fourth-year trading in the new facilities of the RSL. Competition has been fierce within the Maroondah municipality over the past years. With redevelopments at Eastland including thirty-one odd restaurants and bars, the complete redevelopment at



the Croydon Hotel and the change of ownership at the Coach & Horses (Collingwood Football Club) to Melbourne Racing Club which owns the Croydon Hotel that has undergone a repositioning and redevelopment. There has also been change of ownership in key restaurants in the area and extended operational hours at other venues in Maroondah. This all adds to extra variety and competition making it a very challenging market in the hospitality industry. Except for our food sales all other areas show growth on 2018, with an increase in our profitability of over 250%.

ENTERTAINMENT

We continued with Morning Melodies throughout 2018 with some mixed results, some shows we had under forty guests and others were over sixty, although all members and guests had an enjoyable time. This year I have moved it to Tuesday afternoons so as not to clash with other venues in the area and to coincide with our Two For One Seniors meal deal on a Tuesday lunch time.

The shows that were booked last year were very successful: - ELVIS attracted 215 numbers Hotel California had (115) guest, BABBA (138) and Fleetwood Mac (138). Both BABBA and Fleetwood Mac shows were both sold out. All these shows introduce new visitors to our club gaining us new trade and members. This year we have booked ELVIS, Fleetwood Mac, Gold Chisel and Aussie DC. We will also continue with our Friday night entertainers, looking to introduce new performers, while still booking the favourites.

PROMOTIONS

The AFL / Marvel Stadium footy season ticket give away will begin on the 11th March in time for the first game at the new Marvel Stadium on Saturday 23rd March. This is a full member only promotion where you receive a ticket in the draw for every \$25 accumulative spend each week, that's two tickets if you spend \$50 or three tickets if you spend \$75 during the week.

We will be kicking off our AFL footy tipping competition again this year with the same format. \$30 entry \$1,000 first prize, \$400 second prize \$20 third prize, your money back for second last and a FREE pot of beer, wine or soft drink every time you hand your card in.

If you haven't signed up for communications and promotions then you're going to miss out this year, we will be increasing the offers to members through our APP and emails. These offers will be exclusive to members that have moved towards engaging the modern forms of communication. With the increase cost of mail and the lack of reliability we need to move further to these means of communication, even my 87-year-old father in-law can use email and has a smart phone with our APP.

CHRISTMAS

The Christmas Giant Raffle was another great night had by all, including SANTA and The ELF but it was sadly the best raffle night in 2018 with all other raffles running at a loss, draining needed funds away from welfare. This year we intend to run a midyear raffle in June with a prize pool over \$30,000 including that great looking MG SUV car in our foyer and another one in December, so see our staff in the bar or at reception for your ticket in the raffle. Don't miss out!

And that special day of the year when we catch up with family to celebrate another year "Christmas Day" we were sold out again. All who attended had a fantastic day & the compliments just didn't stop. So, thank-you to the members and guests who participated in the day of festivities and thank-you to the staff that worked so hard to make it a special day.

CONCLUSION

I'd like to thank the committee and staff for their continuing support and hard work over the year. Although we had a good year in 2018, the changing attitudes to poker machines and drinking and the increased competition will make it a challenging environment for the future. I will strive with our dedicated staff and committee to ensure our future so we may deliver the services and support needed to the ex-service members and the wider community.

A quick update on three items of interest:

The first is about memorabilia and the Sub Branch's association with Victorian Collections – Museums Australia. Their grant of \$5,000 was spent on a new computer, camera and host of containers to store



our "items" in a professional manner. The memorabilia crew are - George Ward, Colin Vincent,

Brian Roe, David Liggett, Peter Fogarty and Peter Hedgcock, and thanks to their efforts there are 432 items on computer and on the internet

Australia for everyone to look at. We estimate that there are still another 3000 to process.

Secondly, the RSL in conjunction with the Ringwood Historical Society received a grant of \$27,000 from the Department of Veteran Affairs, Canberra, to develop and install what is termed a "Heritage Walk". There are 15 stations to be developed, two of the sites are the Clocktower and the mural under the bridge on Wantirna Road. This exercise will take several months as we are dealing with different authorities.

Thirdly, at the end of each year we present to Ringwood, Norwood and Heathmont Secondary Colleges a bursary of \$600 each. This amount to be given to students as each college nominates. Every now and then we receive a response from a student, please see below contents of a handwritten letter from a recipient of Norwood Secondary College.

"I cannot express the extreme amount of gratitude I have for receiving this award. Not only do I thank you for this, but also for the service you have provided for this Country. Without the bravery and sacrifices that you and others nobly gave, we would not have the freedom that nowadays we take for granted. Again, I thank you so much for presenting me this award."

<u>Australian Veterans' Recognition</u> (Putting Veterans and their Families First) Bill 2019

The Federal Government has introduced a bill into the Commonwealth Parliament to recognise the role played by serving and former members of the ADF in defending this Nation. In it the Parliament also recognises the role played by members' families. It acknowledges the unique nature of military service and the sacrifice demanded of those who commit to defend our nation as well as the demands placed on, and the sacrifices made by the families of veterans.

The Commonwealth also acknowledges that veterans may require support mechanisms to enjoy good health,

- to access employment and training opportunities,
- to access appropriate housing,
- to have access to justice,
- to enjoy social wellbeing or to participate in community engagement after the end of their military service.

The Commonwealth commits to supporting veterans and providing the care and support they require acknowledging that veterans should be supported to achieve greater economic wellbeing and sustainability and greater participation in civic affairs and should have opportunities to participate in employment and education.

The Government in its bill also introduces an Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant as a public expression of support for and commitment to support our serving and former ADF members. In this Bill the Parliament, on behalf of the people of Australia, endorses the Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant

This is a very welcome and significant initiative that will form the basis of relations between the Government and veteran communities into the future.

The wording of the Covenant is:

Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant

We the people of Australia respect and give thanks to all who served in our defence force and their families

We acknowledge the unique nature of military service and sacrifice demanded of all who commit to defend our Nation.

We undertake to preserve the memory and deeds of all who have served and promise to welcome, embrace and support all military veterans as respected and valued members of our community.

For what they have done, this we will do.

FROM THE TREASURERS CALCULATOR

The statement of P&L reflects a profit for the 2018 financial year of \$46,919, prior to the completion of the audit, this represents a turnaround of \$53,560 against the 2017 financial year loss.



Things of note that I'd like to expand on include:

All trading areas with the exception of the bistro showed signs of improvement. Overall total trading profit was up \$36,304.

RSL trading was up by \$32,827. This resulted in net trading profit increase of 4.8%. Operating expenses of the club were marginally up by \$25,807 or 2.2% on last year.

The report highlights a positive turnaround in the performance of the club and, in my opinion, is a result of the focus of management in the provision of improved member facilities and entertainment.

Having said this, the committee, management and members of the Ringwood RSL need to understand the competitive environment that we trade in and focus on the challenges that need to be addressed to ensure the success of our great club.

I would personally like to thank the management, staff, committee and members of the club for the work that they do to make this a great club and for making my job as treasurer enjoyable.

Desk of Knowledge-Welfare & Pension

The Welfare & Pension Offices continue to provide support, guidance & overall commitment to our Veterans, community members & family/ friends. During 2018 (& the beginning of 2019) the Welfare & Pension teams continued to engage with local organisations to be able to provide support for many different requirements. The support also incorporates social inclusion & overall wellbeing for not only the Veteran, but their surrounding community of family & friends.

During 2018 the Welfare Office received an increase in the demand for case management & overall support requirements for our Veterans & their families. Due to the increase, the Welfare & Pension teams continued training through multiple methods including:

- * Short courses including Suicide Prevention Training
- * Advocacy Training & Development Programs for Military Advocacy
- * Community training programs including Dementia Awareness

Ongoing training & development continues in 2019 for both the Welfare & Pension Officers, to ensure we are able to provide the most appropriate support & service referrals.

Our Volunteer Services

The Welfare Office continues supporting our network of Veterans, members & community members via visits to homes, hospitals (Maroondah, Knox Private & Ringwood Private), assorted facilities & specific appointments. Demand for these services continues to grow & due to these requests, the Visitation program is expanding in 2019.

Our regular volunteers Mark, Shirley & Judy continue to engage & support our disadvantaged, aged & lonely veterans. They also support the Veterans family & friends as part of their volunteer roles, consistently adapting to the needs of the Veteran.

Fred & Margaret continue to support our Veterans families in times of loss, supporting the family of the Veterans during the Funeral & memorial process representing the RSL.

Our Pension Officers Kevan & Ian work on Wednesday's providing support to our Veterans for Pension related matters. Peter also supports the office, completing administration tasks. The Pension Office is increasing in appointment requests, due to referrals from surrounding Sub Branches. Kevan & Ian work with the DVA to support the requests of each Veteran & their family.

Our volunteers undertake multiple roles without hesitation & deserve the positive recognition received as follows:

•"I never knew that the RSL visited people in Hospital, we are grateful that Mark visited our Dad" •"Please accept my appreciation for the work that Kevin Andrews provided to my wife & I, I would also like to mention the support that Nicole also provided to my wife".

Additional Volunteers are expected to begin in late March, providing additional support services to our Veterans & community (including Chaplaincy). Volunteer interviews continue to be scheduled in 2019.

Our Programs

Our Social inclusion programs also continue to evolve & provide our Veterans & their community a safe & consistent weekly program. Our Strength & Mobility classes maintain (& in some cases improve) our attendees social & emotional wellbeing, as well as their physical state. By attending these classes weekly, our Members are able to reduce social isolation & be supported by additional members in a supportive environment.

Our trained Physiologist also reviews & adapts the program for each member where necessary.

- "The trainer actually knows what he is doing & pushes us"
- "Who would think a class for 45 minutes would improve my health so much"

Our Friday Friendly Group continues to expand their weekly activities & in 2019 the group will undertake training for Dementia Awareness & Advanced Care Planning. The group continues to improve the social inclusion of many members attending each week. Tina (the group's leader) & her supportive group enjoy socialising & undertaking different activities each week, she also volunteers her time for the group.

- "I didn't think the group would be so much fun, I'm definitely coming back next week"
- "Tina was so warm & inviting, I really enjoy coming each week to the group"

Funeral Officers



A Remembrance Day Tribute to Veterans

On this day, we mark the Centenary of the Armistice – the 11th day of the 11th month. The agreement to the end of hostilities between the allied nations and Germany.

The 'Great War' began with conflict in Europe, and spread out to become the first World War. As isolated as the young nation of Australia was, we too were drawn into this vast, all-encompassing conflict as a nation of the British Empire. With a population of under five million people, almost 418,000 men enlisted to fight in the Great War; 62,000 were killed, and 156,000 were wounded or taken prisoner.

On this day, we pause to reflect upon the incredible courage and sacrifices of those who served in the Great War, and to comprehend how important the contribution of our service men and women make is.

The end of the First World War brought to the world a new set of struggles. Defeated, humiliated, and placed under massive financial burdens, the seeds were sown in Germany for the rise of Hitler. Our service men and women answered the call.

Our armed forces have fought and died to protect our way of life, our democracy. They have given so much to protect our rights and our freedoms – the right to life and liberty; freedom of speech, thought and action; and the freedom to make the best life for ourselves and our loved ones. These are the ideals for which our inspirational servicemen and women have strived and sacrificed their lives.

Time and time again, brave Australians have put their lives in danger to protect our country – and indeed the world – from threats to our freedom. In conflicts and peacekeeping operations.

The remarkable courage and selflessness shown by our armed forces throughout Australia was born in the trenches of the First World War, and solidified over the years. The example set by our servicemen and women presents a challenge to us all – what will <u>our</u> response be when times are tough and our way of life is challenged? What will we sacrifice to protect our neighbours and our loved ones? What will we give to make sure that future generations of Australians will enjoy the same freedoms and rights that we do? How will we honour the great sacrifice made by generations of Australian servicemen and women?

On this day, 100 years since the guns fell silent on the Western Front, we mark the Centenary of Armistice. We honour those who served, those who were wounded, and those who fell. We honour their spirit.

May we never forget their courage, their sacrifice, or their example to us all.

The Salt Water group started the season with a weather cancellation on our first charter however all charters since were able to take place with one nice 5kg Snapper taken in Westernport Bay.




There are six more salt water charters booked for early 2019 to complete the 2018/9 Season.


FUTURE
