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FROM THE PRESIDENTS PEN





Australia – Divided Without Visionary Leadership?

As I review the year that has just passed, I wonder where we are headed as a Nation. The Government won the federal election much to the surprise of the arm chair experts. It claimed to have won the support of the "quiet Australians" who were and I believe still are looking for visionary leadership from our federal politicians. Unfortunately although there are isolated exceptions we are still looking! The prolonged drought and the bush fires emergency provide an opportunity for our leaders to step up to the mark, galvanise the public with a message of hope and comfort and initiate actions to help the community cope with their consequences. People on the ground fighting the fires and providing community relief for our farmers are doing wonderful work, but where is the overall marshalling of the various governments' resources and coordination of efforts to cope with the present circumstances and to plan for the future to ameliorate future adverse conditions? The federal authorities have been slow to mobilise an effective response and mobilise the necessary resources, particularly the ADF, and there has been too much foot dragging and bickering. As well there is too much finger pointing and blame shifting among politicians and sectional interest groups.

Underlying this is the increasing division in the community on ideological grounds with little if any tolerance of differing points of view. This lack of vision and effective leadership is not confined to politics; I see similar situations in most sectors of the community. Our church, business, law enforcement, military, community, education, bureaucracy and judicial leaders can all be criticised for losing focus on what their roles are and intruding into areas outside their legitimate realms. This is exacerbating community angst and is not providing ideas to help us move into the future with any level of confidence let alone unity.

Unfortunately the RSL is not immune from this. There have been many shortfalls in its approach to veteran advocacy and support that have emerged resulting in government intervention in some cases. I would like to think that this would have spurred the national and state bodies into drastic actions to revitalise the institution but disappointingly I cannot see much evidence of this. The RSL is a resilient organisation but if it is to remain relevant to its constituency it must reform itself in a way that attracts bigger numbers of more recent veterans into its ranks.

Why is all this relevant to us as an ex-service organisation? The simple answer is that we remain the voice of those who have paid a price as members of the Australian Defence Force defending our freedoms and way of life. We cannot let their sacrifices be in vain; we must continue the fight to keep our embracing and tolerant culture and our individual freedoms.

The RSL motto that "the price of liberty is eternal vigilance" remains very relevant.

About our Sub Branch and its Club

We are part of a network of sub branches that is integral to the fabric of the Victorian community. It is important to remember that our trading operations are essential to generate the revenue from which the benefits we provide are funded. Some of this revenue comes from gaming operations but gaming is always only an adjunct to what we offer our members.

Our primary objective as an RSL Sub Branch is to support serving and former ADF members and their families as well as our other members. We offer members activities and facilities to host "get-togethers" to enjoy each other's company, to swap stories and particularly for veterans, to share experiences and support and help each other in an empathetic environment.

Our Veteran and Community Contributions

The welfare and support work for the veteran and local communities remain the major focus of the Sub Branch.

- Over a year we help some hundreds of veterans in the Eastern Metropolitan Region of Melbourne. We provide assistance with their claims for support from the Department of Veterans' Affairs and our Welfare Coordinator and her team of volunteers provide much needed welfare and practical support to veterans in our region as well as to the older and less mobile members of the Sub Branch. These volunteer services include in-home and hospital support, welfare help, transport assistance, mobility aids as well as minor house and garden maintenance etc. These services have a particular value for our frailer members but also for others in our community who need our help. This volunteer support to the Maroondah community is worth in excess of \$285,355.
- We conduct commemorative services for the Ringwood community to mark ANZAC and Remembrance Days at the Ringwood Clock Tower Memorial Park.
- We have been involved with a number of local football teams spread from Mitcham to East Ringwood to partner with them in providing suitable ANZAC commemorative services as a public service.
- We provide bursaries and assistance worth \$1,800 for children attending Ringwood, Heathmont and Norwood Secondary Colleges.
- We support the Maroondah Brass and the Ringwood Pipe Bands with sponsorship of \$3,000 each.
- We provide support to members of the Sub Branch with subsidised meals and refreshments, and other "in club" activities designed to combat social isolation and enhance camaraderie among veterans and their families. The cost for these was approximately \$277,058. In addition we have allocated Loyalty Points able to be spent in participating RSL establishments in Victoria at a cost to the Sub Branch of \$32,300.
- The Welfare/Courtesy Bus is provided for members benefit as part of our social inclusion program at a cost of \$66,779.

- We provide sponsorship of and support for the Women's Auxiliary, War Widows, the Day Club and Sub Branch Sporting Sub Sections worth over \$31,218.
- We provide \$4,000 sponsorship to the Ringwood Football Club, \$ 3,000 sponsorship for Eastern United Football (soccer) Club and \$3,000 for the Raptors Rugby Club.
- We provide facilities either free of charge or at nominal rates for local community group activities at a cost of \$37,250 during 2019.
- We contribute about \$3m to the local community in goods and services purchased and employment of 50 staff from the surrounding community.

In total we contribute some \$3,732826 worth of benefits to our veterans and community.

We are not for profit. We operate with the sole purpose of supporting veterans, our members and their families. That said, the revenue from gaming helps enables us to continue play an important role in the health and well-being of veterans and their families. At the same time we work hard to ensure our gaming operations are properly conducted within the regulated framework. Never the less with the assistance of an E-Gaming expert, we are actively exploring the possibility of introducing E-Gaming as part of a longer term plan to phase out the poker machine operation.

Securing our Future

Our trading situation remains challenging. The food and liquor operations are performing well but the poker machine side of the business more directly mirrors the general economic situation where there is a diminishing level of discretionary spend available to many families as the increasing cost of living bites into their budgets. As well the more recent deployments have been with machines with a higher return to player ratio than was generally the case previously. Whilst the Sub Branch remains in an overall healthy financial position we must look to the future where the acceptability of "pokies" among the younger generations is not as amenable as it has been to date and we are facing a future that requires us to plan for decreasing net revenues from them. Thus the Committee is planning for the future with renewed facilities and a lesser reliance on "pokies".

The Committee has been working hard on the redevelopment project. It has been in detailed discussions and negotiations with both the developers and the State Branch Trustees and their legal advisers to develop an agreed "Heads of Agreement" that will form the basis of a development contract for the project. This is a complicated project that has the potential to ensure the viability of the Sub Branch well into the future so the detailed work to gain the various approvals although tedious and lengthy is well worth the effort. More specific details are contained in the "Redevelopment Newsletter" available at reception.

My thanks go to the "Redevelopment Team" especially Christian Bolog and Des Myers and I'm very grateful to Harry Agathagelides and Wayne Chisholm for their work and support of the project.

BANTER FROM THE MANAGER



Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all the members.

2019 has been a frustrating year with trading. We have had growth in the Bars +5.2%, Bistro +3.8% and Membership +4% 198, however Gaming Revenue has gone backwards -11.2%. This has impacted negatively on our bottom line.

The food and beverage services we provide are performing very well however gaming in line with most poker machine operations across Victoria has been on a decline over the last twelve months. The Maroondah area is the second worst local government area in Victoria for gaming performance. The State last year saw ten consecutive months of decline which is quite significant - historically the maximum period of decline we have seen has been two months and that was considered relatively large. Gaming is still the greatest revenue area for us and is the largest profit centre compared with bars and food. This is consistent for just about all clubs and although we make a good profit from gaming, there are substantial annual costs associated with operating gaming machines as shown in the table below:

ENTERTAINMENT

Afternoon Melodies on Tuesdays has been well received with over 450 members and guests enjoying the afternoon. We have all new entertainers for 2020 starting in February. The three shows of ELVIS (Damian Mullin) attracted 284 guests to the shows and we have two more booked in for 2020. BABBA will also be back after last year attracting 180 guests. The Friday night FREE entertainment will continue with some changes to the line-up, but keeping with the tempo and style of music from last year.

RAFFLES

The two Welfare Raffles this year were both successful selling 7,756 tickets which raised \$13,171 for welfare. We will be continuing this program over the forthcoming year.

OAKS DAY

This year was our first Oaks Day function, small (31 guests), but well received and all wanting to do it again this year.

CHRISTMAS

Christmas Day was another great success with over 150 members and guests dining with us for lunch with nothing but compliments to the chefs and staff.

PROMOTIONS

In 2020 we will continue to run Marvel Stadium footy ticket giveaways, Football Tipping Competition, Senior 2 for I Tuesday lunches', Friday Night Members Draw, Friday Night Meat Tray Raffles, Tuesday Night Parma's for \$15, Wednesday Night Steak's for \$20, Thursday Night Pizzas for just \$10 and continue to run Happy Hours in the Anzac Bar. We will be introducing some new and exciting promotions throughout the year. To stay up to date with what's happening make sure you have agreed to receive promotional emails and download our APP at the Google playstore or Apple.

COURTESY BUS

Last year I was successful in obtaining a grant from the DVA to cover 85% of the cost for a new courtesy bus and we also gratefully received funds from the hardworking Women's Auxiliary which contributed towards the purchase cost. This year I have again applied for a grant to replace the ageing Ford transit bus which is on its last legs and we will be replacing it with a bus of the same size.



CONCLUSION

With the help of the staff and committee we will strive to make all your experiences at Ringwood RSL enjoyable and fulfilling.

When finished the club should know just what it has in the collection, the value and have most of the items that are not on show packed away ready to be placed in storage for when the renovations start.

The team has had a couple of changes through the year. Peter Fogarty went onto full-time employment thus had to leave us. We thank him for his input while with us. A replacement soon stepped up and Shirley Devery joined us in May 2019. Shirley shares our passion for military history and has worked for a number of years as a Volunteer Shrine Guide. She is also a member of the Ringwood RSL Women's Auxiliary.

Although the Victoria Collections dominates our time, we have also managed to change and clean up a number of the displays.


The Scouts and Cubs continue to visit and view the memorabilia and these are generally fun nights. For one group it has become an annual event.

TREASURERS REPORT 2019

The summary of Profit and Loss for financial year ending 31st December, 2019 reflects a NET PROFIT of \$34,970.



I'd like to take the opportunity to focus on a few areas that influenced this result.

- The turnover in the ANZAC bar (up 14.19%) and the Bistro (up 2.26%) were extremely positive and reflect the significant effort to improve the experience and quality of service in those areas.
- Gaming turnover was down 8.3% on last year, whilst payback was at 91.07% compared to 90.7% last year. The combination of these had a negative effect on the bottom line of over \$200,000.
- RSL revenue was on par with last year a pleasing result considering the decision to drop the membership fees by \$15. The extra revenue was a result of the two successful big raffles and interest income on our term deposit.
- RSL expenses were up by 11.2% a reflection of members discounts over the bars and restaurant, the subsidised Seniors meals and the improved courtesy bus facility.

Moving forward to 2020, I can report that we have restructured our loans with the ANZ bank (November 2019) which will provide us with interest rate savings of around 1% and are currently in discussions with Tabcorp which will provide significant improvement in our gaming income. Our budget for 2020 shows our club returning a profit of \$129,061.

I would personally like to thank the management, staff, committee and members of the club for the work that they do to make this a great club and for assisting me in my role as treasurer.

Looking forward to working with you all again to ensure 2020 is a great year for this special club.


Defence Veterans' Covenant



The Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant serves to recognise and acknowledge the unique nature of military service and the contribution of veterans and their families. The Covenant is supported by the Veteran Card, Lapel Pin and Oath. These provide the opportunity for Australians to identify veterans when they are not in uniform or wearing their medals, and offer respect to them and their family. Employers, businesses, local community groups and the broader Australian public are able to commit their support for the Covenant. The Covenant provides the framework that enables veterans and their families to better connect with their community. Veterans and Reservists can now apply for the Covenant, including the Veteran Card, Lapel Pin and Oath, online using MyService. Depending on your type of service, you may be eligible for all, or some, of the Covenant items. These items will be sent in the mail, noting that the Lapel Pin and Oath will be sent separately to the Veteran Card.






There are six more charters over the next three months that will see season 2019/20 completed.


